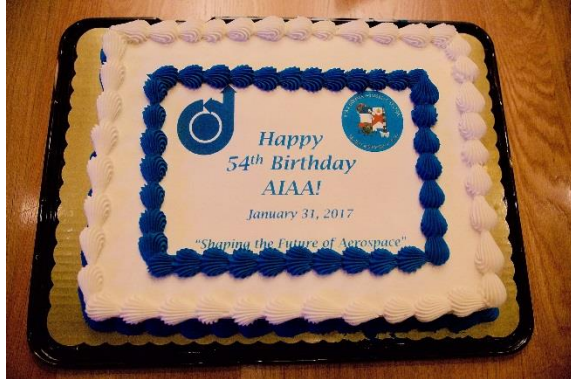


## AIAA Birthday Celebration

AIAA was created on January 31, 1963 through the merger of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences and the American Rocket Society.
